Rossbrook House is 45!

They say *time flies when you're having fun.* Rossbrook House has seen its share of fun for sure. Since 1976, the doors have remained open for children and youth. What started as a safe place for teens has evolved over the years to include programming for children, young moms, and students.

"I think in some ways, right from the beginning, Rossbrook House was trying to expand kids' horizons. Part of that was just to get kids outside of the regular environment that they'd been in," Executive Director Phil Chiappetta said.

Today, Rossbrook House employs community youth, giving many their first jobs. There are three alternative school programs, camp outings, and scholarship opportunities.

Many former participants recently shared their memories:

"Rossbrook House has been in my life since 1980 and will always be in my heart. I attended two of their schools and I know I had the best teachers ever! I have met so many people and am still friends with them." ~Shirley

"My memories are driving in the van almost every day and either going to McDonald's or 7-11. Then beating the other kids in pool." ~Georgina

"I remember about 40 years ago we loaded up the big red van and went for drives and ice cream. In summer we would go often go to Grand Beach for the day... I have many fond memories!" ~Marvin

"Rossbrook is important to me. I definitely had a lot of great friendships. Friendships that were more like family." ~Rachel

KEEPING DOORS OPEN 24 HOURS

Since the COVID-19 Pandemic in March of 2020, Rossbrook House has been a port in the storm- a place to be fed, safe and warm. We're providing two meals a day as well as take-away meals for those who are hungry.

"During this time Rossbrook House has also become a refuge for homeless youth and adults as they struggle with the consequences of the pandemic and the bitter cold of Winnipeg weather," Phil Chiappetta said.

During one bitterly cold February weekend, emergency shelter was needed more than ever. Various shelters

and emergency warming sites, including
Rossbrook House, coordinated together to
ensure that everyone had a place to
stay warm.

Keeping our doors open 365 days of the year has been what we do – since 1976.
Keeping the doors open 24 hours, every single day is not the regular routine but it's what has been happening for several months.

We have computer stations set up for children and youth to watch movies, play games and do their school work and distance learning. The

Learning Always program is running twice a week giving participants help with their schoolwork. We have crafts and other activities after-school and on weekends. The kitchen is busy providing delicious meals, 7 days a week; brunch and an early supper.

We're grateful to our supporters, like you, who have helped us to remain open every day.



"I dance because it's part of my culture. I love to dance. It gives me a chance to express myself," Drayton, 11 years old, said. "Dancing represents me and my family," he said. "I like getting ready for the Pow Wow with my friends at Rossbrook."

The Rossbrook House Pow Wow will not be happening this spring. This tradition has been a huge part of Rossbrook House for almost 40 years. Many participants and former students have fond memories of the Rossbrook House Pow Wow. We hope to make more memories again soon!

What Rossbrook **House Means to Val**

Eagles' Circle school changed my perspective on Indigenous Peoples. At one time, I was ashamed of who I was because of the bullying I went through. Eagles' Circle teachers helped me realize that I can be proud of my heritage through cultural events, Indigenous oriented plays, Pow Wow, writing and learning how to bead. I became proud of being Indigenous.

I was amazed the first time I walked through the doors, at 12 years old. It was late at night and I was welcomed into a safe environment. I saw teenagers having fun playing pool, playing cards, listening to music and hanging out.

Rossbrook House is important to the community because it teaches youth that they can make positive choices that will help them grow into responsible adults. Everyone is welcome.

Rossbrook House gives a person a sense of belonging and that's important to me. I didn't feel that I fit in at other places. Here, I was included, and my voice mattered.
