You could say that Patty Mainville has **returned** to Rossbrook House. She officially took over as Executive Director in early September.

"The amount of supports and mentors I have had over the years have been instrumental in the direction in which my life has led me, which is full circle," Patty says.

As a youth, Patty attended Rossbrook House programs, was a junior staff member and graduated from Rising Sun high school. She went on to become a teacher and a principal in the Winnipeg School Division. Although she never stayed too far away from Rossbrook House, returning each year to help prepare the dancers for the annual Rossbrook House Pow Wow with not only the correct steps but cultural teachings as well.

"I became involved in Pow Wow as a Jingle Dress dancer at a time in my life where I needed to connect with my Indigenous teachings, traditions, and ceremony. The positive lifestyle and pride of the Indigenous culture was not always made available to me as a child, and I always wanted to share this with youth."

Patty is Anishinabek from Treaty 3, Couchiching First Nation Ontario. She is a proud mother of four sons, a grandmother and great-grandmother.

"One of the many focuses of Rossbrook House is to mentor the participants with leadership skills and to build

on their strengths," she says. "I have had the honour to know and be mentored over the years by many of the great people who have built, lead and contributed to Rossbrook House, from the Nuns to the many staff, and participants."

Patty's skills and experiences as an educator have given her insights into youth and community that will help drive and support the work that we do. "I believe in providing youth with a safe place to grow, learn, and become. To offer support, skills, tools, and teachings so that youth can self-determine their own journey and navigate through their paths."

Patty is looking forward to meeting more community members, stakeholders, participants, and funders.

"I will always be thankful to the Rossbrook House family and am excited about this next chapter".
