Programming with Pride

There's a wide range of programs available for children ages 6 to 11 and youth ages 12+, after-school and on weekends. From drop-in music lessons, and cooking classes, to sports and homework help.

Did you know that Rossbrook House has incorporated aspects of Indigenous perspectives in our programming since it's inception in 1976?

Today, a huge percentage of our staff and participants are of Indigenous heritage therefore, we must look at our programming through an Indigenous lens to align with Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action.

A new language program was introduced in April with participants learning Ojibway. A traditional beading class began in January and includes cultural aspects as well. The participants' work will carry their energy and so they are reminded to be mindful of their feelings while beading.

Gifts of Grandfather Rocks were given to attendees of the No Child Alone Dinner in April. Each rock was decorated with an image from the Seven Sacred Teachings. As each child or youth took the time to craft the animal, they were reminded of the teachings passed down from their ancestors. Rocks have special meaning to Indigenous peoples- as does their connectedness to the land, water and sky.

The annual Pow Wow is another way that Rossbrook House has supported its community, bringing dancers and drummers together. Children and youth have been learning how to dance for decades and learning the significance of the Pow Wow circle.

The intent behind these goals is a simple one: To infuse children and youth with pride and a sense of belonging. Pride while learning a new skill. Pride in embracing their Indigenous heritage. Pride in becoming who they are meant to be.
